



Item 1 - Introduction: Is an investment advisory account right for you?

Hyperion Partners, LLC is registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission as an investment advisor. Please be aware that brokerage and investment advisory services and fees differ and that it is important for you to understand the differences. Free and simple tools are available to research firms and financial professionals at Investor.gov/CRS, which also provides educational materials about broker-dealers, investment advisers, and investing.

Item 2 - What investment services and advice can you provide me?

We offer investment advisory services to retail investors. Our principal services include wealth management, financial planning, and pension consulting. As part of our standard wealth and portfolio management services we provide continuous and regular supervisory and/or management services with respect to your account(s). We do not monitor the investments made as a result of a financial plan unless you have hired us for wealth management or portfolio management services. Our portfolio management services are offered on either a discretionary or non-discretionary basis. Discretionary authorization allows us to determine the specific securities, and the amount of securities, to be purchased or sold for your account without your approval prior to each transaction. Non-discretionary arrangements require us to obtain your approval prior to executing any transactions on behalf of your account. We do not limit our advice to proprietary products, or a limited menu of products or types of investments. In general, we require a minimum of \$1,000,000 to establish a relationship with us. At our discretion, we reserve the right to waive this minimum.

- Given my financial situation, should I choose an investment advisory service? Why or why not?
- How will you choose investments to recommend to me?
- What is your relevant experience, including your licenses, education and other qualifications? What do these qualifications mean?

Item 3 – What fees will I pay?

We are primarily compensated by a percentage of assets under our management and fixed/retainer fees. Our fees vary depending on the services you receive. Wealth management and portfolio management fees are based upon a percentage of your assets under our management, and are payable each quarter in arrears. The more assets there are in your advisory account, the more you will pay in fees. Therefore, we have an incentive to encourage you to increase the assets in your account. When we provide stand alone financial planning services, we charge a fixed fee or a retainer fee. Our pension consulting fees are based on either a percentage of assets under management or a fixed fee. Our fees are negotiable depending upon the complexity and scope of the service, your financial situation, and your objectives.

Description of Other Fees and Costs: The fees that you pay to our firm for investment advisory services are separate and distinct from the fees and expenses charged by investment companies (e.g., mutual funds, exchange traded funds, unit investment trusts and variable annuities). These fees are described in each fund's prospectus. These fees will generally include a management fee and other fund expenses. The broker-dealer or custodian may charge your account for mark-ups and mark-downs, dealer spreads or other costs associated with the purchase or sale of securities, interest, taxes, or other costs, such as national securities exchange fees, charges for transactions not executed through Schwab, costs associated with exchanging currencies, wire transfer fees, or other fees required by law or imposed by third parties. Additional fees imposed by Schwab may also include custodial fees, retirement account fees, trust fees, exchange fees, redemption fees that may be assessed on investment company shares, transfer fees, account termination fees or other special service fees and charges. We do not share in any portion of these fees imposed by the broker-dealer or custodian. To fully understand the total cost you will incur, you should review all the fees charged by investment companies, broker-dealers, our firm, and others.

You will pay fees and costs whether you make or lose money on your investments. Fees and costs will reduce any amount of money you make on your investments over time. Please make sure you understand what fees and costs you are paying.

Conversation Starter. Ask your financial professional—

Help me understand how these fees and costs might affect my investments. If I give you \$10,000 to invest, how much will go to fees and costs, and how much will be invested for me?

What are your legal obligations to me when acting as my investment adviser? How else does your firm make money and what conflicts of interest do you have?

When we act as your investment adviser, we have to act in your best interest and not put our interest ahead of yours. At the same time, the way we make money creates some conflicts with your interests. You should understand and ask us about these conflicts because they can affect the investment advice we provide you. When we provide investment advice to you regarding your retirement plan account or individual retirement account, we are fiduciaries within the meaning of Title I of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act and/or the Internal Revenue Code, as applicable, which are laws governing retirement accounts. We have to act in your best interest and not put our interest ahead of yours. At the same time, the way we make money creates some conflicts with your interests.

Here is an example to help you understand what this means:

All investment advisers face conflicts of interest which are inherent in the business. Our primary source of compensation is through asset-based fees. Therefore, we are incentivized to acquire new clients and to increase assets under management. We engage in other business activities, such as insurance sales; and, we have relationships with third party service providers, including other financial institutions such as Schwab, which result in inherent conflicts of interest.

Conversation Starter. Ask your financial professional—

How might your conflicts of interest affect me, and how will you address them?

How do your financial professionals make money?

Our financial professionals receive salary-based compensation. Additionally, financial professionals who are part owners of our firm share in the profits generated by our firm. Our financial professionals are also insurance agents. Commissions generated by these individuals will be paid to the firm. Therefore, financial professionals who have an ownership interest in the firm have an incentive to encourage you to increase the assets in your account or to purchase insurance products from us to increase our firm's profitability. You are not required to purchase insurance products from our financial professionals.

Item 4 – Do you or your financial professionals have legal or disciplinary history?

No, our firm and financial professionals do not have reportable legal and/or disciplinary history.

Material Changes to Client Relationship Summary
